Key Knowledge What? Who?

Apply the moral teaching of the story of the man in Medina to the children's own life experience (Qur'an 9: 128).

Explore different ideas of God. Examples given from Hinduism, Islam, Sikhism and Christianity.

Explore the beauty of Adhan (the call to prayer).
